

Key West's current living legend embodies the spirit of our islands infamous forerunners in the guise of shipwreck salvors, road weary writers and bar owners; it's safe to say that best-selling author Jimmy Buffett has certainly found treasure in Margaritaville. So he and Mac came into town on Lincoln's Birthday to share the new song, spend some time with old friends and favor the Margaritaville crew with Key West classics, the songs *we* know by heart.



Wounded Warrior is a nonprofit organization devoted to raising public awareness and support for soldiers severely injured in the current military conflicts around the world. Jimmy performed at a benefit concert for the organization several years ago and turned us on to their cause. Wounded warriors made their annual stop in Key West on Saturday, January 17 cycling down Duval Street past a throng of sign bearing, flag-waving Margaritians and local supporters.

Soldiers and volunteers were met with lengthy cheers and salutes from a Key West crowd anxiously assembled at Memorial Park in Truman Annex. The City of Key West recognizes the importance of the maritime industry in the area and has granted the USS Mohawk CGC Memorial Museum a slip at Memorial Park. This is a prestigious location for the floating ships that can be viewed from water and land, offering an enticement for locals and visitors alike to come onboard.

Local dignitaries, introduced by MCPO Lloyd Pierce welcomed the tired two-day tourists with plaques and pronouncements thanking them for their obvious sacrifices. Emotions ran surprisingly high among the grateful group, due not to the military or mayoral speeches, but rather in response to the young men and women seated on bicycles before us. Those bound to a code to "take the hit" so we don't have to. Soldiers driven not by politics, oil policy or religious convictions, but by the age old desire to serve. But they were not here for pity or reward, they were here for the same reason all visitors come to the Keys - to take a break from their lives and enjoy themselves.

A wide variety of bars and attractions offered their services to the gallant group, who took full advantage of the welcome, the weather and the wonderment that Key West has to offer - from fishing and sailing, beers and burgers, to Diva's and Drag Queens. We met up with the gang at the Margaritaville Cafe later that afternoon to meet with the soldiers on a more personal level, got to know some of their stories and their hopes and wishes for the future.

Former professional cyclist Saul Raisin joined the wounded veterans on this ride. Saul suffered a traumatic brain injury **TBI** in an accident during a race leading up to his first Tour de France. Saul is committed to raise awareness and hope for victims of TBI, considered to be the signature wound from the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Another surprise guest joined the band of brothers Sunday morning. Jimmy Buffett passed the security checkpoint and shared breakfast with the group, bouncing from table to table like a groom at a wedding, posing for pictures and wearing out his Sharpie.

Volunteers told us how therapeutic this trip had been, that many of the men had not been so animated or alive in months. We are so proud to have been a part of it, so pleased that many others in town were involved, and so appreciative of the Soldier Ride organization for sharing their cause.
